MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

An early morning group of volunteers gather, stomping their feet to keep warm, trying on work gloves and learning about the trees that they will plant later that day. It isn't an easy task. Lifting heavy plants onto wheelbarrows that take two people to push, digging holes filled with rocks and roots, before finally planting their tree and carefully tamping dirt around the roots. This is just one of the volunteer-driven projects the Foundation has funded this year. We also supported small teams of volunteers pulling invasive species, removing trash, restoring wetlands, sampling water, planting pollinator gardens and getting their hands dirty on other projects in the parks.

Zoom has also become a regular meeting place for some of the parks' most loyal volunteers, who serve on committees and boards of park associations and other park partners. They work alongside Metro Vancouver Regional Parks staff, whose workplaces include the park trails and office desks, with a common passion for connecting people with nature and making regional parks the best they can be.

This year, volunteers from the BC Film industry raised \$164,000 in the first ever Reel Earth Day Challenge. Led by Creative BC and Reel Green, funds raised supported 7 projects and leveraged a further 1,000+ volunteer hours, 3,720kg of invasive plant removal and the planting of 5,529 trees and plants (and counting!).

We are grateful to the Metro Vancouver Regional Parks Committee, staff and all our volunteers. Your service and commitment enriches our parks, improves our lives and inspires us all.

Gordon Smith Youth Environmental Stewardship Award

The 2021 recipients demonstrate leadership in conservation and inspire other young people to get involved in environmental work.

CTS Youth Society is a non-profit outdoor youth program, completely free for every participant. The Foundation is proud to support this program year after year, as we believe every youth deserves the opportunity to attend summer camp, regardless of their circumstances.

In 2021, our donors helped CTS Youth Society:

- Relaunch overnight camping programs postpandemic
- Put smiles on 252 campers faces
- Equip youth with leadership and outdoor skills
- Connect young people with nature and their community
- · Connect 112 households with nature
- Fuel campers with free, healthy meals as well as the supplies and training they need to explore the beauty of the regional parks and come home safe
- Log 466 volunteer hours in regional parks

CTS Youth Society was also able to try out some new programs, such as exploring the "Birds of Burnaby Lake," courses in how to "Survive Outside," and repurposing their items in a "T-shirts to Tote Bags" up-cycling class.



Approved Grants

Pacific Parklands Foundation funds many grants, big and small. Here are some of the exciting projects we brought to fruition in 2021.



POLLINATOR GARDEN

The Derby Reach Brae Island Park
Association built a raised-bed pollinator
garden with native flowering plants and a
mason bee house in the Heritage Orchard.
Volunteers utilized plants our local
pollinators love, such as red columbine,
nodding onion, Douglas' aster, goldenrod,
and pearly everlasting.



INTERPRETIVE ART MURAL

Kanaka Creek Regional Park is a hot spot for conducting education programs about salmon and the "fish fence" installed in the creek each fall to obtain broodstock for the nearby Bell-Irving Hatchery. The mural will tell the story of the salmon lifecycle, their connection to our ecosystem, and the importance of habitat preservation and conservation, all while adding dynamic colour to the site.



BARN OWL NESTS

Boundary Bay Park Association was able to build barn owls (a threatened species) their own nest boxes at the Delta Air Park. The best part? As shown in this photo, they already have tenants!



Approved Grants



LANGLEY BOG CLEANUP

BCIT, along with Derby Reach Brae Island Park Associations, were able to cleanup and restore the park by removing 16 industrial tires from the bog wetlands and bringing them up and out of the bog area to higher ground where debris was being collected for pickup. This was followed up with a moss transplant project.



EQUESTRIAN RING RESTORED

The Bowen Island Horse Owners and Riders Association were provided a grant to replacing the footing in the riding ring at Crippen Regional Park. This project will ensure the safety of riders and horses during events, shows and pleasure riding. It will also benefit all of the islanders and visitors who come to the shows and events and use the facility to play disc sports, have outdoor gym class activities, and other outdoor activities.



NATURE BROCHURES

Delta Naturalists Society were able to add to their collection of brochures that spotlight local nature and wildlife in Delta. Adding to the *Birds of Delta* resources, the new titles are: *Animals in Delta*, *Bugs in Delta*, and *Intertidal Life in Delta*.



REEL Earth Day Challenge

In 2021, the first ever REEL Earth Day Challenge was presented by Creative BC's Reel Green[™] program and industry partners, Pacific Parklands Foundation and Earth Day Canada.

The challenge raises funds for the Foundation to protect and preserve Metro Vancouver's regional parks, where many of B.C. productions are filmed. The REEL Earth Day Challenge encourages crews, productions, sponsors, and other industry stakeholders to raise funds in the days leading up to Earth Day, April 22nd. Industry sponsors contribute to the top teams' daily challenge totals, and the production that raises the most funds overall is declared the winner.

'The Scriptures' team were declared our first ever challenge champion! Thank you to all participants, donors, and industry supporters who took part in the challenge. Because of you, we raised over \$164,000 to restore and protect Metro Vancouver regional parks.

Together, we:

- Planted trees in Aldergrove Regional Park
- Created a pollinator meadow in Pacific Spirit Regional Park
- Removed invasive plants at Capilano River Regional Park
- Helped a wetland thrive in Crippen Regional Park
- Replanted forests in Kanaka Creek & Tynehead Regional Parks
- Restored native species at Brunette-Fraser Regional Greenway
- Protected rare coastal ecosystems in Boundary Bay Regional Park





















Bus Grant Program

Do you remember how much fun the "field trip" was when you were in school? Do you recall that it was even more fun if the trip was to a natural space like a park? Did you know that this experience is not available to many youth today? Every year thousands of students, seniors and people with financial barriers are not able to visit our regional parks. Why? Because there is no funding to charter a bus.

We are working to change this through our bus grant program. With your help, in 2021 we connected even more groups to the beauty of nature found in Metro Vancouver regional parks. One \$500 donation makes the dream of a chartered bus a reality. Your donation can and has made a difference.

From October 1, 2020 to September 31, 2021, we approved 15 bus grants, resulting in 495 individuals receiving the necessary but otherwise unattainable opportunity to connect with nature.

2021 Events

Nature Connections Webinar Series

2021 was another year of finding new ways to experience nature - online!

Usually, the Nature House in Campbell Valley Regional Park features guest presenters throughout the summer as part of the drop-in programming. But when the pandemic hit, park staff came up with a new way to provide park visitors with fun, fascinating ways to learn about nature in the park: the Nature Connections Webinar Series.

The Foundation was proud to support another year of free one-hour webinars which touched on a range of topics, including owls, frogs, turtles, butterflies, bears, pond life, urban wildlife, bird-banding, backyard birding, species at risk and biodiversity.

Bedtime Nature Stories Webinar Series

In an effort to connect young children with their local nature, Metro Vancouver park interpreters logged online to share their nature knowledge and a special nature bedtime story with the community (from the comfort of their own home). With the Foundation's support, each night began with a nature knowledge segment including interactive quizzes and finished with a fun bedtime story about nature that got local little ones settled in bed.

Regional Parks Snap & Share

In the Spring of 2021, we partnered with Metro Vancouver to encourage locals to explore Metro Vancouver's regional parks and greenways through the iNaturalist app. This led participants to pay attention to plants and wildlife they may not have noticed before by snapping photos of what they discovered and sharing their photos with the iNaturalist online community. With public health orders in place, this was a fun outdoor activity for all, whether on their own or with their bubble. With a ton of fun prizes up for grabs, 6,444 observations were made, 1,035 species were observed, and 639 identifiers participated.

Art's Nursery Scarecrow Stroll

The Foundation was humbled to be a beneficiary of this exciting autumnal event, which involved a pumpkin patch, scavenger hunt, and dozens of creepy, cool and creative scarecrows. Alongside the flowers and food trucks, Art's Nursery invited local businesses to promote their company or organization during this popular family fundraiser in support of charity. A special thanks to the CTS Youth for the creation of a camper scarecrow, which represented both CTS Youth Society and Pacific Parklands Foundation at the nursery.
